Kindergarten Registration

Registration for September 2017 Kindergarten placement will begin on January 9th, 2017. <u>All new students</u> who wish to enter the Kindergarten French Immersion program must register between January 9, 2017 and February 10, 2017 at 4:00. Students who currently have siblings here at Confédération and live in our catchment area will be guaranteed a spot provided they register within these timelines. Please contact the main office to schedule an appointment to register your child. You will need to provide a birth certificate or proof of age/citizenship, and proof of current address to register.

Monthly Assemblies

During the month of February, we will encourage students to "Seek First to Understand, Then to Be Understood". In many ways, listening is the most important communication skill of all. Less than 10% of communication is contained in the words we use. The rest comes from body language and the tone and feeling reflected in our voice. When we truly listen, we listen with our ears, our eyes and our hearts.



Building Healthy Relationships

The best gift you can give your children is your time. Show that you enjoy devoting time to them. Show your children that their time and energy can make a difference too, and recognize

the value they offer. Encourage them to take part in community projects such as helping seniors or tending a community garden.

Create opportunities for your child to be successful:

- Help them find out what they are good at doing;
- Help build their confidence in their skills and abilities;
- Be active together. Choose something you both like and can do;
- Be sure to comment on a job well done or an act of kindness; and
- Acknowledge when they meet a difficult challenge with perseverance.

Coin de l'immersion/Immersion Corner



How can you help your child learn French?

There are several key things that you can do at home that will help your child to do well in the Early French Immersion (or any second language program).

Remember, it doesn't matter what language you speak at home, try these tips to support your child's language development.

Help your child become a great communicator: Reading and writing skills start with good listening and speaking skills. All four skills are interconnected, and the Ontario curriculum strikes a balance between them. However, it is listening and speaking—the oral communication skills—that are considered key in second language learning.

Effective oral communication involves many factors, such as choice of words, tone of voice, volume and body language. When you draw your schil's attention to theses elements of communication and show them in action, you provide a strong foundation for the development of effective communication skills in French, English or another language. Helping your child develop a broad vocabulary in English, or the language you speak at home, has added benefits. It helps develop thinking skills, teachers your child to communicate with precision and provides more opportunities to make connections with French.

Peanut/Nut Aware School

A few reminders about food policies at École Confédération:

* We are a peanut/nut aware school. Please do not send peanut based products, peanuts, or any nut/soy products that may contain any of these items to the school.

The safety of other children depends on this.

* Peanut butter substitutes are not allowed in elementary schools in GEDSB.

* Food is not permitted on the school playground at recess and at lunch. Students are permitted the opportunity to eat their snacks and lunches prior to going outside or immediately following the morning and afternoon recess periods.

Any treats sent in for special occasions (such as Valentine's Day) must be prepared in a health unit inspected and approved kitchen. All products must be nut free.

Student Pick Up

From <u>3:15-3:45</u> pm daily, our parking lot is used as a bus loading zone for our 9 buses. There is <u>NO PARKING on site for</u> <u>student pick up at the end of the day.</u>



There are two accessible parking spots that are available for those with permits only.

At all times, cars may not be parked under signage that marks a fire route. Be especially aware of fire route signs located in the front drive around curve and the sign posted along the sidewalk by the front entrance to the school.



All students that are not riding a bus will be dismissed through the gym doors. Caregivers may park on Coronation or Stodola streets, on the opposite side of Ewing Drive from the school. If you wish to meet your child at the school, please walk to the doors outside the gym. A crossing guard is stationed in front of the school to assist.

Thank you for your help in ensuring a safe dismissal for all of our students.



Active Winter Fun for the Whole Family Winter is here to stay for a while, but there is no need to hibernate indoors. Instead, go outside

with the whole family and enjoy playing old games or trying out some new ones.

Use personal examples to relate your experience to that of people who use math as part of their jobs.

Celebrate people who use math every day to do their jobs-carpenters, firefighters, nurses, engineers, computer programmers, and accountants.

Watch the weather forecast together. Talk about all the ways the meteorologist uses math-maps, tracking the speed of fronts, and giving the probability of precipitation for the coming days.

When you watch airplanes approach the runway, describe the job of air traffic controllers. This job uses precise mathematical measurements to guide jumbo jets to safe landings.

Stop and observe surveyors or sports field custodians as thy use trundle wheels to measure distances and tracks.

Inclement Weather and Transportation

Winter is just around the corner. In the event of inclement weather, there is the potential for transportation delays or cancellations and school closures.

BUS # AND ZONE

- 503 = Paris ZONE 3 and 4
- 504 = St George ZONE 3 and 4
- 505 = Ancaster, Hwy 2/53 ZONE 3 and 4
- 507 = BRANTFORD ONLY Zone 4
- 509 = BRANTFORD ONLY Zone 4
- 510 = Lynden Rd ZONE 3 and 4
- 519 = BRANTFORD ONLY ZONE 4
- 528 = BRANTFORD ONLY ZONE 4
- 543 = BRANTFORD ONLY ZONE 4

If transportation is cancelled for schools in Zone 3 AND 4, École Confédération will be CLOSED. WE ARE ZONE 4 (CITY OF BRANTFORD) AND ZONE 3 (FOR BRANT COUNTY STUDENTS).

A reminder to all parents that École Confédération is in Zone 4 and Zone 3 for those living in Brant County for all bus cancellations and school closures. BUSES 503, 504, 505, AND 510 COME FROM ZONE 3 BEFORE PICKING STUDENTS UP IN ZONE 4 FOR CONFÉDÉRATION - IF ZONE 3 IS CANCELLED THERE WILL BE NO PICK UP FOR STUDENTS IN BRANTFORD ON THOSE BUSES. BUS 507, 509, 519, 528 AND 543 ARE BRANTFORD BUSES ONLY AND WILL NOT PICK STUDENTS UP IF CANCELLED FOR ZONE 4.

Please listen to Radio Station CKPC (1380 AM and 92.1) or CHCH TV.

To see if buses are cancelled due to bad weather, or fog delay, you can go directly to the transportation website from the school website or the GEDSB website (under the parents tab). Click on the "home" tab and then the "transportation" tab, and look for zone 3 & 4. Please also check the bus delay icon to see if there are any bus cancellations listed there. You will need to know your child's bus route number to see if their route has been cancelled.

click cancellations – closures and Bus Delay icons. You can also sign up for email notifications on this site. Click on the BUS DELAY icon then hit the SUBSCRIPTION icon and sign up for email notification. This must be done every year. Updates can also be received by following @STSBHN on Twitter.

In the event of a mid-day closure, the school telephone lines will be needed to work through our Emergency Phone Fan-Out to contact families. It is very rare that the school will be closed half way through an instructional day. On days of inclement weather, the staff of STSBHN and the bus companies, who provide service to our area, are actively reviewing current road conditions and future weather patterns in order to make a determination on delayed or cancelled transportation services. Information is collected from a number of sources and a decision is made and posted no later than 6:30 a.m.

As the decision to run, delay or cancel transportation is made in advance of services actually being provided, there may be some instances where variability exists in what was forecast versus what actually occurs. STSBHN



and its member school boards want to provide options for the parents and students of our area and so, when it appears safe to do so, transportation services will be permitted to continue as usual.

If, on an inclement weather day you feel that your child(ren) would be better off not taking the bus and either being transported into school by yourself or staying home altogether as a result of the road conditions at or near your home, STSBHN and the boards do understand and respect that this decision ultimately rests with you.
