You Belong Here

The 'You Belong Here' video series continues to provide families and future high school students with a helpful preview of what's to come at secondary schools across the region. Let's take a look at the latest in the series.

Secondary Math Professional Learning

Secondary educators took part in the Grand Erie Math Achievement Action Plan kick-off session, gaining new skills to work with resources including Mathology, structuring content to support diverse learning needs, and using short and longterm strategies effectively with a lens on special education. Educators also heard from Grand Erie's Indigenous Education team which provided Indigenous perspectives on math class to further understanding.









Innovation Hub Hosts Hackathon

The Innovation Hub hosted its first Hackathon, inviting secondary students from across the region to pitch and test out ideas. Learners explored topics including robot recycling collection, reverse osmosis water treatment solutions, solar panels that mimic plants, and app development to balance screen time with physical activity and well-being. The participating teams then had an opportunity to take their ideas to the next level with Apple Canada.

Facility Services Professional Learning

Facility Services, along with CUPE 5100, hosted its annual professional learning day. Nearly 200 Facility Services staff including custodians, caretakers, lead hands, maintenance and management staff, gathered at Hagersville Secondary School for a day of learning. Workshops were presented on a variety of topics including asbestos, equipment care, benefits, health and safety, and human resources.









Hagersville Secondary School Teacher Inspires Young Leaners

The EarlyON program at Hagersville Secondary School got a preview of what awaits them on their educational journeys when science teacher Kenneth Johnson opened his classroom doors. Young learners explored how water mixes with different substances in a series of fun, hands-on experiments. Johnson, who's earned the reputation of 'cool science guy,' says it's never too early to start exploring the sciences, building on young learners' curiosity and interest in the natural world and how it works.

Family Science, Technology, **Engineering, Art and Math Event**

The Innovation Hub hosted a special evening event in partnership with Let's Talk Science and McMaster University which saw an attendance of nearly 200 people. The free event for families included engaging, hands-on activities in science, technology, engineering, arts, and math. Participants took part in activities and games like Build your own Bacteria, Elephant Toothpaste, Food Web Jenga, a STEM Cup Challenge, and Awesome Algorithms. Special thanks to the dedicated staff members involved for their hard work in making this event such a success.



Scholarship for Paris District High School Athlete

Madison Burr is taking her hockey skills to the University of Minnesota Duluth next year. The accomplished secondary school athlete received multiple NCAA Division I scholarship offers after playing in several leagues and being named to the national under-18 team. She led the Paris District High School team to the local championship.

Grand Erie Parent Involvement Committee Event: Managing Kids and Tech

Grand Erie Parent Involvement Committee hosted another session in its speaker series, presenting Alyson Schafer, an internationally acclaimed parenting expert and mental health practitioner, for the workshop, 'Managing Kids and Tech.' Addressing a big issue for families today, the session explored how parents and caregivers can appropriately manage technology to harness the positive value while mitigating the harm. The workshop left families with confidence, tools, and an action plan for healthy technology use in the household.



Incoming Student Trustees Ready to Lead

The student voice was heard as Grand Erie's Student Senate and United Indigenous Student Council made their decisions to select who will represent learners across the district for the 2025-26 school year. Prabhisidak Singh of Brantford Collegiate Institute and Vocational School was elected to represent students from the north region of Grand Erie; Harper Thompson of Simcoe Composite School will represent students in the south region; and Ryleigh Staats of Delhi District Secondary School was elected through a consensus model to represent Indigenous students in Grand Erie.



Centre for Excellence in Action

As Black History Month concluded, the Centre was the site for 'Black Joy,' with the African Caribbean Cultural Club from Walter Gretzky Elementary School and Carnival Spice dance company taking part. The event focused on the strength, creativity, diversity, and resistance that shapes Black communities, and included learners and staff members from École Confederation and James Hillier in the audience. It left the lasting impression that these contributions should be celebrated not just during Black History Month, but every day.





Staff Take Part in Para Hockey

Education staff at Langton Public School had a chance this winter to try out sledge hockey, an adaptive activity that ensures individuals with special needs can take part in Canada's national winter sport. Staff experienced firsthand the physical, strategic and competitive demands of sled hockey, fostering understanding of how to support learners with diverse needs. The event was a partnership with South Coast Special Needs Kids Inc.







Kick-Start to Kindergarten

Kick-Start to Kindergarten was in full swing, with events taking place across the region. The interactive events provided a space for little learners to venture into the world of education for the first time as a sneak-peek of what's to come in their first year of school. The sessions also enabled families to connect with board and community resources, meet other families, and the dedicated staff members who inspire a love of learning.





















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Ontario Skills Competition

Brooke-Lynn Criddle-Brown and Wishv Jitendrakumar Patel, both students at Pauline Johnson Collegiate and Vocational School, competed in the Ontario Skills qualifier at Niagara College, placing first and fourth, respectively. Both earned a spot at the provincial Ontario Skills competition.





Coding en français

Junior French Immersion classes from across the board took over the Innovation HUB at North Park to show off their skills in coding en français. Their teachers have been participating in a project named "eSTIM de soi en FLS", which is a play on words combining STEAM and 'esteem,' signifying confidence in French through STEAM learning. This project was made possible through a grant from the Ontario Public School Boards' Association, which provided funding for coding activities and materials in French.

Dunnville Secondary School Art Project

Dunnville Secondary School art students gave back with a unique exhibit at the Wilson MacDonald Memorial School Museum in Selkirk this spring. We Chair-ish You in Haldimand County features repurposed wooden chairs, designed by students to showcase their creative talents. The chairs were featured in an open house and the project garnered local media coverage.



LEAD Graduates

Congratulations to the staff members who completed the LEAD program this spring. The series of sessions is open to Grand Erie staff from any employee group interested in exploring the concepts of leadership. It aims to support participants as they identify leadership within themselves, their current roles in relation to the system, and to explore leadership opportunities both personally and professionally.













Family of Schools Learning

Administrators came together to gain a better understanding of how to support students in using numbers and operations to solve mathematical problems encountered in everyday life. The day was a chance to get hands-on experience and learn from the student perspective, and use that experience to go deeper into the curriculum.

Bite of Brant

The annual Bite of Brant program attracted nearly a thousand Grade 5 students to the Burford Fairgrounds over two days to learn about agriculture and its importance in the community. Students gained an understanding of the farm-to-table journey our food makes and left with an appreciation of the abundance of production coming from Brant County to feed the province.


Earth Week in Grand Erie


Muslim Association of Brantford








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Education Week
