Graduation Requirements

Effective in 2024, students must complete **30 credits** to earn an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). That's **17 compulsory** credits plus **13 elective** credits.

Compulsory Credits (Total Of 17)

- 4 Credits in **English** (1 credit per grade)
- (3) Credits in Math (at least 1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
- (2) Credits in **Science**
- (1) Credit in **The Arts**
- 1 Credit in Canadian Geography (Grade 9)
- (1) Credit in Canadian History (Grade 10)
- 1 Credit in French as a Second Language
- 1 Credit in **Health and Physical Education**
- (5) Credit in Career Studies
- (5) Credit in Civics
- 1 Credit in **Technology Education** (Grade 9 or 10)
- 1 Additional credit from the **STEM-Related** course group



What is a Credit?

A credit is granted upon completing a course with a minimum grade of 50%. Compulsory credits are mandatory, and elective credits are up to you!

Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD)

Students will earn an OSSD by completing a minimum of 30 credits and community involvement requirements

Ontario Secondary School Certificate (OSSC)

Students may be granted an OSSC by earning a minimum of 14 credits, including seven compulsory credits.

Certificate of Accomplishment

Students may be granted a Certificate of Accomplishment if leaving secondary school at age 21 without having met the requirements for the OSSD or OSSC.



Graduation Requirements

Effective in 2024, students must complete **30 credits** to earn an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). That's **17 compulsory** credits plus **13 elective** credits.

STEM-Related Course Group

- **Business Studies**
- **Computer Studies**
- **Cooperative Education**
- Mathematics (in addition to the three compulsory credits currently required)
- Science (in addition to the two compulsory credits currently required)
- **Technological Education** (in addition to the one compulsory credit required)

Other Graduation Requirements

Elective Credits

In addition to 17 compulsory credits, students also earn 13 elective credits. These credits can be earned in a variety of subjects.

Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT)

Students must complete the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test as a graduation requirement. Those who don't pass on the first try will have an opportunity to rewrite the test or complete the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course.

Graduation Requirements

Effective in 2024, students must complete **30 credits** to earn an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD). That's **17 compulsory** credits plus **13 elective** credits.

eLearning

Students must complete a minimum of two **eLearning courses** to meet graduation requirements of the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).

To opt-out, a parent/guardian must complete an opt-out form available at the school.



Financial Literacy Requirement

Starting in September 2026, you must earn a new **financial literacy graduation requirement** as part of your compulsory Grade 10 mathematics course. You will need to achieve a mark of 70% or higher to pass this new requirement and earn your high school diploma.

40 Hours of Community Involvement

Students must complete **40 hours** of community involvement as a requirement for graduation.

Grade 9 and Grade 10 Course Types

Academic

Academic courses develop students' knowledge and skills through the study of theory and abstract problems. These courses focus on the essential concepts of a subject and explore related concepts as well. They incorporate practical applications as appropriate.

Locally Developed (L)

Locally Developed courses are designed for students who have specific learning needs and require more direction in the classroom. Students will learn essential skills and practical concepts of a subject.

These courses should be chosen in

consultation with the students and parent/caregiver if the student is working below grade level and has an IEP. They are also intended for students who require a measure of flexibility and support in order to meet the compulsory credit requirements in English, mathematics and science for the Ontario Secondary School

Certificate (OSSC).

Open

Open courses, which comprise a set of expectations that are appropriate for all students, are designed to broaden students' knowledge and skills in subjects that reflect their interests and prepare them for active and rewarding participation in society. They are not designed with the specific requirements of university, college, or the workplace in mind.

P Applied (P)

Applied courses focus on the essential concepts of a subject and develop students' knowledge and skills through practical applications and concrete examples. Familiar situations are used to illustrate ideas, and students are given more opportunities to experience hands-on applications of the concepts and theories they study.

W

De-streamed (W)

De-streamed courses prepare students with knowledge and skills, transferable skills and work habits to be successful in academic or applied courses in Grade 10.

Grand Erie has de-streamed courses to remove barriers and provide students with equal opportunity to succeed. If a course is not yet de-streamed, you will select the academic (D) course.



Grade 11 and 12 Course Types

C College (C)

College courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the entrance requirements for most college programs or for admission to specific apprenticeship or other training programs.

Workplace (E)

Workplace courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the expectations of employers, if they plan to enter the workforce directly after graduation, or the requirements for admission to certain apprenticeship or other training programs.

M University/College (M)

University/College courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the entrance requirements for specific programs offered at universities and colleges.

Open (O)

Open courses, which comprise a set of expectations that are appropriate for all students, are designed to broaden students' knowledge and skills in subjects that reflect their interests and prepare them for active and rewarding participation in society. They are not designed with the specific requirements of university, college, or the workplace in mind.

U University (U)

University courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the entrance requirements for university programs.







Additional Opportunities and Programs

Secondary school is a time to broaden your horizons, explore your interests and set the tone for what's next. Grand Erie has something for everyone, so dive in!

Dual Credit

Earn a college and secondary credit at the same time. Students receive college-level instruction aligned with the college curriculum, with the support of a secondary teacher. The **dual credit** program is often delivered at the same time and location as a secondary course. However, certain opportunities offer an on-site experience in a college lab. This program is available to Grade 12 students approaching graduation.

eLearning

Are you an independent learner with good organizational and time management skills? **eLearning** might be for you. Courses are taught asynchronously in a virtual learning environment called Brightspace, and they're led by a secondary teacher in Grand Erie, or from another Ontario school board. To be successful, students must regularly attend and participate, just as they would in face-to-face classes. Speak with your guidance counsellor to register.

Experiential Learning

Experiential learning is offered at all grade levels. Examples include hands-on projects, LEGO Spike, virtual reality experiences and more.

Co-operative Education (Co-Op)

Earn a secondary credit while exploring a potential career path. **Co-operative education** allows learners to gain real-world experience related to the school curriculum. Placements are guided by the company's employees and a Grand Erie co-op education teacher. Students can apply two co-op credits to their compulsory graduation requirements, and can even complete additional co-op placements as elective credits. Co-op placements are arranged by the secondary school's co-operative education teacher. Contact your school's guidance counselor for more information.

Co-operative education can also provide students with additional opportunities:

Job Shadowing

Student observes a worker in a specific occupation (e.g. Take Our Kids to Work Day)

Job Twinning

Student observes a co-operative education student at their work placement

Work Experience

Student obtains first-hand experience in the work environment.



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Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

Explore a skilled trade and begin an apprenticeship while working toward your OSSD. OYAP students may begin work placements at 15 years old with 14 credits completed, though some workplaces may require a minimum age of 16. Through co-operative education, OYAP provides students with on-site work experience and the opportunity to register as an apprentice with an employer. Students can explore the skilled trades in either full-day or half-day placements.

OYAP - FAST

OYAP-FAST is an accelerated stream of OYAP that allows students in Grade 11 and 12 to participate in more apprenticeship learning while working towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).

Reach Ahead Summer Courses

Grade 7 and 8 students can earn a secondary credit before starting secondary school with **Reach Ahead** summer courses.

Specialist High Skills Majors (SHSM)

Receive training and experience in a subject of your choice while working toward your OSSD. Grand Erie provides this opportunity over a two-year period starting in Grade 11.

SHSM students take part in a co-op placement and industry-related activities to learn more about career options. Upon completion of the SHSM program, students will receive a red seal on their diploma. Participating students will also be eligible to receive financial benefits to support post-secondary pathways in the industry.

Project | SEARCH

Project | SEARCH offers workplace immersion for students with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities.

Students learn transferable skills at a host site that can support a variety of employment opportunities in their community.

75% of Project | SEARCH Canada graduates secure quality employment within a year of graduation.



Additional Opportunities and Programs

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Specialized Programs

For information about specific specialized programs offered at your secondary school, speak to your Guidance Counsellor. Additional information may be found on your secondary school's website.

French Immersion Programming

Grand Erie offers two secondary French programs: Core French and French Immersion. Core French and French Immersion programs differ in intensity but share a common purpose: to develop a student's oral communication (listening and speaking), and reading and writing skills in the French language. Both French language programs provide benefits to students regardless of whether or not they plan post-secondary studies in French. Starting in September 2026, French Immersion will be offered at Brantford Collegiate Institute & Vocational School, McKinnon Park Secondary School and Simcoe Composite School.

Diplôme d'études en langue française (DELF) The Diplôme d'études en langue française (DELF) is an internationally recognized certification of proficiency in French for those learning French as an additional language. DELF exams take place in 175 countries worldwide. Grand Erie offers Grade 12 students in all French pathways (Core

and Immersion) the opportunity to challenge the DELF exam level that best suits their proficiency.


International Student Opportunities

School-Specific Supports

Guidance Counsellors

Guidance Counsellors can help you select your courses and plan your pathways – now and in post-secondary. They may also connect you with further supports, such as Child and Youth Workers, Attendance Counsellors, Public Health Nurses, Social Workers and more.

Learning Resource Teachers

Learning Resource Teachers can provide support to maximize student achievement and well-being. They work with staff to arrange committees and conferences, assist in evaluations and reporting, organize placements and work with community agencies.

Student Success Teacher

Student Success Teachers support students who are facing barriers to success. Their supports may include assisting students with developing self-advocacy and time management skills, providing strategies to support credit achievement, supports for successful transitions, and graduation achievement.

Homework Help

Students in Grades 9-12 may access after school help with their schoolwork from educators at their Secondary school. Speak to your Guidance Department at your school to learn more.

Indigenous Grad Coaches and Six Nations Education Counsellors

Indigenous Grad Coaches provide supplementary student achievement and well-being support for all First Nations, Métis, and Inuit learners. They provide culturally appropriate programming, facilitate student leadership, build relationships, and assist with student success. Six Nations Education Counsellors provide supplementary counselling and liaison services specifically to students from the Six Nations of the Grand River, enrolled at six secondary schools.

Technology and Innovation Hubs

A first-of-its-kind for **STEAM** (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math) learning in Grand Erie, the purpose of this multifunctional space is to cultivate an ecosystem of exploration, imagination and future-ready skills development for learners in grades 7 through 12. Starting in September 2026, every student in Grand Erie will have access to a Technological Focused Education. This program is designed for students taking courses in all four OSSD pathways, and located at one of three Technological Hub locations.

Centre for Excellence

Centre for Excellence: Teaching, Learning and **Belonging**, is a unique space designed to foster inclusion and community in Grand Erie. The Centre, accessible to everyone in Grand Erie, plays a meaningful role in building community connections through shared learning

experiences and access to resources, programming and opportunities for engagement.

The Grand Welcome Centre is a place where all students new to Canada, entering the Ontario school system for the first time, and their families are welcomed into the Grand Erie community.

To honour inclusion, Grand Erie supports student placement in a general education classroom within their home school: however, a selfcontained placement may be considered and confirmed by an Identification, Placement and Review committee.

We value your voice! Placement in self-contained programs, including integration and exit planning, is a collaborative process with parents, caregivers and students. Each year a student's placement is reviewed to ensure individual strengths and needs are being met.

Will de-streamed and open classes support any pathway?

Answer: Absolutely! Courses in grade 9 are designed to prepare students for any pathway they may choose after high school.

I need help choosing my courses and planning the best path for me. Who should I speak to?

Answer: Guidance Counsellors will support you with pathway planning and course selection. Further support may be found with your grade 8 classroom teachers, myBlueprint Career & Life Planning tasks, Administrators, Learning Resource Teachers, and Student Success Teachers.

How long are my classes?

Answer: Great question! Secondary school classes are 75 minutes long.

When can students start collecting community involvement hours?

Answer: Students may begin collecting their community involvement hours on July 1st of the year they graduate from grade 8.

What if I need extra help? How do I access academic or specialized supports (guidance, social worker, school officer, public health nurse)?

Answer: Make an appointment with your secondary school's guidance counsellor. They will connect you with specialized resources.

Where do I put my personal belongings?

Answer: In secondary school, students are assigned a locker to place personal belongings (backpack, binders, personal devices, etc). Purchasing a lock can ensure your belongings stay secure.

Does my Individual Education Plan (IEP) transfer to secondary school?

Answer: Yes, your IEP continues as you transition to secondary school. To learn more, connect with your new school's Learning Resource Teacher.

Answer: Summer school offerings are listed on granderie.ca in the spring. You can also speak with your guidance counsellor to help choose the course that's right for you.

Do you want to learn more about your Grand **Erie Secondary school before you start grade 9?**
