What you need to know about head lice!

Head lice is common in school aged children.

Head lice are tiny insects that live on the scalp.

They lay tiny eggs (nits) that turn into insects (lice) which are the size of a sesame seed.

Signs of lice: your child may have an itchy scalp and scratch their head.

How are lice spread: spread easily, especially with close play or sharing of objects like hats, helmets, and hairbrushes.

- If you discover that your child has head lice, tell the school and anyone who has had close contact with your child. Children with head lice should be treated and can attend school.
- Lice shampoo products have been shown to be the most effective method for getting rid of head lice.

There is no medical reason for excluding a child with head lice from school or child care.

Did you know that all children and youth, 17 years and younger are eligible for free eye exams in Ontario?

- 👁 Vision problems are common among school-aged children but are not always easy for parents to detect.
- 👁 Vision problems can lead to challenges in school, play and every day activities
- 👁 The Health Unit offers school-based vision screening to senior kindergarten students each year.
- 👁 Vision screening does not replace the need for a full exam by an eye doctor.
