Lockdown and Fire Drills

Every year, schools are required to do a number of fire drills and lockdown practices. Our lockdown are completed for this year. We encourage parents to continue to talk to



their children about this. It's important for children to understand that lockdowns take place for a variety of reasons: intruder, unsafe student behaviour in the school, a situation taking place in the school neighbourhood. It's also important for students to know that these lockdowns are in place to keep the children safe.

We also have three fire drills in the Fall and three in the Spring. Students have been advised where they need to exit as well as their alternate exits in the school.

As part of your parent talk, ask the children to explain to you the procedures. This is not only good practice for them but also a great way to relieve some of the anxiety.

Nut Allergy Alert !!!

Some students in our school have **severe allergies** to nut products that could cause death. We also have staff with a shellfish allergy.

A plan is in place at the school to assist in case of an allergic reaction with the specific students.

We ask our school community for understanding that this matter is serious and ask that you refrain from sending nut products and shellfish to school with your children.

Reminders about Student Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting

The Ministry of Education has published a document entitled <u>Growing Success</u> which outlines procedures and practices related to student assessment, evaluation, and reporting. Growing Success is intended to guide the collection of meaningful information that will help inform instructional decisions and promote student engagement while improving student learning. Parents have an important role to play in supporting student learning and therefore need to be fully informed about students' progress.

- ♦ Learning Skills include Responsibility, Organization, Independent Work, Collaboration, Initiative and Self-Regulation. These now appear on the 1st page of the report card. An example of the descriptors for the Learning Skills is included for information.
- To ensure equity for all students, major assignments for evaluation and tests are to be completed under the supervision of the teacher. Therefore, work done at home may not be used for evaluation purposes.
- ♦ There will be an Elementary Progress Report Card that will come home the week of November 12th. The purpose of this Progress Report is to show development of the students' learning skills and work habits (Excellent, Good, Satisfactory or Needs Improvement), as well as a student's general academic progress (Progressing with Difficulty, Progressing Well, Progressing Very Well) in the fall of the school year.
- ◆ There will be a formal interview on November 14th at night from 3:30 8:00 and November 15th in the morning from 8:00 12:00.
- ◆ There will be two Elementary Provincial Report Cards sent home at the end of January and the end of June. Interviews will only be scheduled if needed due to academic or behavioural concerns at that time.

Work Habits - Sample Behaviours that will appear on the Progress Report

Responsibility	The student: • fulfils responsibilities and commitments within the learning environment; • completes and submits class work, homework, and assignments according to agreed-upon timelines; • takes responsibility for and manages own behaviour.
Organization	The student: • devises and follows a plan and process for completing work and tasks; • establishes priorities and manages time to complete tasks and achieve goals; • identifies, gathers, evaluates, and uses information, technology, and resources to complete tasks
Independent Work	The student: • independently monitors, assesses, and revises plans to complete tasks and meet goals; • uses class time appropriately to complete tasks; • follows instructions with minimal supervision.
Collaboration	The student: • accepts various roles and an equitable share of work in a group; • responds positively to the ideas, opinions, values, and traditions of others; • works with others to resolve conflicts and build consensus to achieve group goals;
Initiative	The student: I looks for and acts on new ideas and opportunities for learning; demonstrates the capacity for innovation and a willingness to take risks; demonstrates curiosity and interest in learning; approaches new tasks with a positive attitude;
Self-Regulation	The student: • sets own individual goals and monitors progress towards achieving them; • seeks clarification or assistance when needed; • assesses and reflects critically on own strengths, needs, and interests; • identifies learning opportunities, choices, and strategies to meet personal needs and achieve goals.

Safe Welcome



Grand Erie District School Board implemented the Safe Welcome Program within all of its elementary schools.

Parents can now expect that all elementary school entrances are kept locked during the school day to prevent entry from anyone who does not have authorization.

Closed circuit television and controlled access buzzers were included in the installations.

School administrators, teachers and secretaries have been notified of the program guidelines and protocols as well as the system functions to continue to ensure that our schools remain safe and secure places for our students to achieve and succeed in their learning.

Please be advised that students in the building have been told not to open doors to anyone. The use of the buzzer to the secretary's desk is the only way into the school. If you are a visitor at the school, we ask that you do not let in other visitors/parents as they will need to use the buzzer to come in as well. This is sometimes frustrating as people may have to wait to be let in. Please be patient with our staff as we are following board protocols. These protocols are in place to keep the children and staff at the school safe.

During "Work-To-Rule," please be advised that secretaries will not be opening doors when you are buzzing to get in. The principal may be attending to other concerns and will get to the door as soon as possible. We appreciate your patience during this time.

As parents, we want our children to be safe at school and want to help them when a conflict occurs. As a school, we teach the students about Kelso's Choices and programs that specialize in problem solving when encountering conflicts with peers. Sometimes, children will require adult support to assist in conflict resolution.

As a school, we sometimes find that parents and students use the term bullying during any type of conflicts with students and their children. In order to assist you in distinguishing the difference between conflict and bullying, we have included a chart for your use.

Conflict VS. Bullying
